In addition, residents enjoy cultural events such as attending theatrical and musical performances, and experience the "Joy of Art" through a program conducted at the Village by a group talented local artists.

Historically individuals at the Village have lived under the unwavering watch of their parents or guardians, who have helped them achieve relative self-sufficiency. The Independence Village is committed to perpetuating a secure, nurturing home that our residents deserve. Although our residents'

functional abilities provide them with varying degrees of independence, every person with disabilities share's a life-long need for safe,



permanent housing. The Independence Village fulfills this need. In addition to providing a secure, comfortable, happy home, we link residents to resources in the community that provide personal fulfillment, independence, socialization and integration.
